



1. This is probably the most flexible idea. The fishing net would slide over bottle, the tag could be made out of fabric and color coded to coincide the type of liquor the decanter contains.

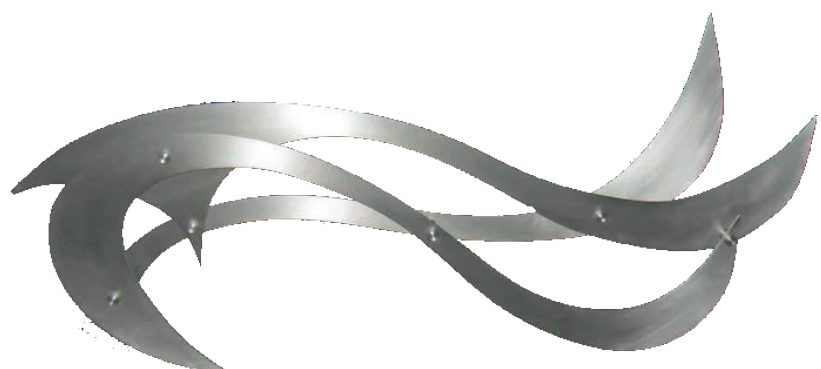


2. A wave pattern would be etched into the glass and wrap around base. A different color seaglass or coral could be attached to the front of the decanter with the initial of the type of liquor it contains sanblasted (etched) into the stone.



3. The thought here is to have the type of liquor etched into the bottle. The brand would be etched into coral or seaglass. The stone or glass color could be different for each brand.

Below are some suggested looks for the base of the bottle. The name brand of the liquor could be stamped directly into the metal or the coral/seaglass shape.







3. Brand name hung like a necklace around the neck of the decanter. Brand etched into the seaglass.

Base may be more elegant in a more simple design.

4. This silver base would house the decanter. Name and brand could be printed onto decanter or integrated into the art of the base. This art would be created to look like seaweed or some sealife.



5. Same design as #1 but without the wave etched onto decanter.



Metal base holds the decanters. Type of liquor etched into decanter. Brand name engraved into the metal wave sculpted base.
